

**Brian Cooper introduced our Speaker Bramwell Tovey, Musical Director, Vancouver Symphony**


Maestro Bramwell Tovey demonstrated that he is a man of many talents in addition to his great knowledge and expertise with the many facets of music. He captivated the audience with his humour, his broad knowledge of the world of music and his passion for educating children and young adults to appreciate music in its many forms.

He explained that music is a universal language of communication that does not need translation. It does what words cannot do. He told of a troubled child that presented problems for his teacher, and came to a VSO concert with his class. The next day the teacher asked the students to write a brief statement about the concert. The troubled youngster wrote three lines: it was a very beautiful building; it was beautiful music; and, it was the best day of my life. Bramwell believes that education through music is part of the solution to community problems.

Organized in 1919, the VSO ranks third among Canada's Symphonies and second only in size to the Stratford Festival among institutions for the arts. The three levels of government share the ten million dollar budget with public subscriptions approaching 45% of the total. He is hopeful subscriptions will exceed 50% in the near future.




**Art Eberwein** was the bridge-master for the year's activities which started in February and were played on a Monday evening each month, skipping July and August and concluding in November.
