
DON KROGSETH
Past Chair
The Nature Trust of BC
35 Years of Conservation

West Vancouver resident, Don Krogseth, is an avid outdoorsman and accomplished fly fisherman. He is a member and past Director of the Pennask Lake Fish and Game Club. Don's success in the investment and financial services sectors includes leadership positions with Connor, Clark & Lunn Investment Management Ltd. and Dixon, Krogseth Investment Counsel. He is a past Director of Pembina Pipeline Corporation (Calgary, AB). His commitment to the community has included directorships with the Vancouver Oral Centre for Deaf Children and the Alzheimer Foundation of British Columbia. Recently retired as director of The Nature Trust of BC, Don served ten years including the position of chair. He is a founding member of the newly established Nature Trust Advisory Board. Don is a charter member of the Probus Club of North Shore Vancouver.

Land management is the true measure of our success as stewards of BC's natural legacy. A basic premise of The Nature Trust's acquisition and management of over 61,000 ha (150,000 acres) of sensitive habitat lands involving over 229 properties has been that, over time, these sites will receive the management and maintenance necessary to ensure that the long-term ecological and habitat values for which they were acquired is achieved.

LAST MONTH'S SPEAKER



Ernie McGuire introduced Speaker Nick Geer

Mr. Geer outlined the business structure, operation, success and challenges of NAV Canada and its mission of safety in Canada's skies.

NAV Canada developed out of concerns about the high cost and quality of the operation of our civil air navigation service by Transport Canada. It was privatized ten years ago and is managed by a 15-member board comprised of its stakeholders: the airlines, the Federal Government and the Union, with Mr. Geer as their chairman.

The product is safety with income derived from airline customers who are charged for the services provided, including landing rights and terminal use. During the 10-year period of its existence, the annual cost of operation has been reduced from \$200 M in 1996 to the current and set target of \$50 M.

NAV has changed the numbers of towers and their locations, now operating out of seven centres and 42 towers throughout Canada. Russia has the largest operation of this kind with NAV Canada close behind. Operating in the harsh climate of our north is more difficult than in Russia.


The management of flights across our country and one half of the North Atlantic and North Pacific oceans is a challenging responsibility. NAV's safety record is excellent with no navigation accidents. English is the language of the airwaves and must be used exclusively to eliminate any possibility of misunderstanding communications.

Technological advancements in this industry are their biggest efficiency and growth helper.

The need to control times of departure, runways, flight paths and aircraft spacing on all arrivals and departures is being enhanced through NAV's development of a unique CAT software system which is in place in Canada and NAV expects to earn sizable revenues through licensing agreements with other countries. Radar is being replaced in certain areas. The CAT and a newer ADS-B program development, incorporating GPS technology will enhance the ability to pinpoint aircraft more accurately and contribute to the goal of "Safety in the Skies".

There was an active Q & A period and many members met with Mr. Geer afterwards.
