This is one of John's many popular guided walking tours. John has explored Vancouver

like few others and offers an interesting and entertaining insight into the city's history and architecture. This will be our fifth walk led by John.

Vancouver's Shaughnessy neighbourhood was planned by the Canadian Pacific Railway to be the city's most exclusive residential area and was the first suburb laid out on garden city principals. Here, unlike the rest of the city, the streets follow the contours of the land and the landscape, both public and private is as important as the architecture.

Today, Shaughnessy is still a much sought-after neighbourhood and on this walk we'll explore the neighbourhood and look at how it has developed over time.

## Last Month Speaker - Jon Lumer

Our March speaker Jon Lumer has kindly provided a summary of his talk on Electoral Reform, as well as a copy of his presentation slides now posted on our website at <http://www.probus-northshorevancouver.ca/speakers.htm>.

I would to thank the members for inviting me to speak. It was my great pleasure to address the group and engage in some stimulating back and forth during questions.

Those who attended will likely recall that little focus was placed on different versions of Proportional Representation (PR). In fact, my contention is that an intro to PR must always begin with an analysis of our current system's flaws. These flaws are so many and so manifest when one begins to prod a little, that the particularities of just which system of PR will replace it seem relatively trifling.

I began by asking what we valued about our democratic system. We are rightly proud to live in a democracy after all, and the expansion of democracy internationally has been one of the major contributors to the current unprecedented era of prosperity and global stability.

It seems to me we should ask of our democratic system that (1) it respect the principle of majority rule, that (2) it make us all equal in the ballot box, and that (3) it provide us with actual choice when we cast our vote.

By exploring the results of the last federal election in some detail, we were able to see that in Canada, candidates are very often elected with mere pluralities of the vote, meaning they are not required to obtain a majority. When these returns are aggregated across the country to determine who will form government, we find that the result is often a government holding unchecked power despite having garnered less than 40% of the popular vote. This is not a system that respects the principle of majority rule.

We examined the evolution of the franchise in Canada, how it expanded slowly over more than a century to become as inclusive as it is today. Ironically, the system itself makes a mockery of these improvements, by ensuring most of our votes have absolutely no impact in determin-

ing who will represent us in parliament. The impact of our votes depends entirely on whether we vote for one of the two most competitive candidates in our riding, and just how close that race is. Even voting for a winning candidate may be pointless if they are guaranteed to win by a landslide every time, as we often see with "safe ridings." Every vote cannot be said to be equal in a meaningful sense in Canada. Surprisingly few votes elect anyone to parliament. This is a serious design flaw in our system.

Due to the aforementioned, a number of strategies have evolved for individual voters to work around the system and allow their votes to have some sort of impact. One of these is known as strategic voting. Instead of voting for the candidate, message, and platform you like, you vote for the candidate most likely to defeat the one you find most objectionable. Another strategy is vote trading. This technique involves making a pledge to vote for the preferred candidate of another person living outside your riding, if in return they consent to vote for your preferred candidate in their riding.

Individuals and organizations that practice and promote these methods have rightly identified one of the problems with our system: you are not really free to vote for your preferred candidate because the system works against choice. Yet use of these techniques constitutes an obvious perversion of democracy. On those rare occasions when the citizens are asked to provide their input about who should lead the country, those who understand the system itself know that simply "voting for your preferred candidate" is often pointless.

These problems have been recognized in Canada for nearly a century (since the time we stopped being a two-party system) and are all addressed by the different forms of PR. Under PR, you get government endorsed by majorities of voters, every vote counts, and you are much freer to vote for your preferred candidate or party. These are the reasons that this issue will not go away. If I am not able to convince an audience that these problems absolutely demand that some form of PR be introduced, then there is no purpose whatsoever in discussing the many varieties of PR available to us.
