years and ever since the formation of our Club on the North Shore. As noted in earlier updates to members, the Bridge Club caters to both those who wish to play



Last Month Speaker - Mayor Mark Sager, District of West Vancouver

Mayor Sager's topic was to highlight his first year of Council including accomplishments as well as what was ahead. This is his second time being Mayor. His first time was 30 years ago. He gave kudos to Ron and Joanne Wood, and others, who were instrumental in contributing to current thinking and actions. You can read the 2024-2025 Strategic Plan on the District of West Vancouver website with details of the Council's Strategic goals and objectives for the year.

A lot has changed in 30 years, but especially communications. Letters and written correspondence were once the way citizens and the District communicated. Now everything is instant – emails and texting - due to technology.

The first project referred to was the track at West Vancouver Secondary School. The track was in poor shape. In November 2023, \$8 million was approved for improvement of the track and facility. A special effort is underway to recognize a man who had run for Council and was a friend of the Mayor – Keen Lau – who was drowned last year attempting to rescue a dog. A Go Fund Me page has been set up to raise money for an outdoor fitness center in his honour.

The District recently purchased Jimmy Pattison's house on the waterfront, the second to last one remaining of the 1976 Waterfront Acquisition Plan. This plan has always been very controversial. In the beginning it cost \$350,000 to purchase a property which seemed outrageous at the time. In this case 2 lots on Roseberry were traded for the house. A company has been hired to repurpose the wood instead of sending it to a landfill.

Another project is the restoration of Navy Jack House. This has ties to Squamish First nations and was an original waterfront home. It will be open to the public as a meeting place for coffee etc. when it is completed.

A hard look will be taken of commercial enterprises in Ambleside. Currently there are many non-retail businesses such as money exchanges and nail salons.

Last year, in Dundarave, outdoor patios were approved and built for the enjoyment of citizens. A new tennis facility was built. For obtaining building permits, the time it takes has decreased from 4 months to 4 weeks. In Horseshoe Bay the new park was completed, and it is a gem. Trolls was purchased by local residents, and it will continue to be a vital part of the community going forward. You may have noticed rock scaling happening on the roads which has been undertaken to increase safety.

Scott, a new municipal manager, has recently been hired. He was born and raised in West Vancouver. He joined the police department and worked for them for 30 years before joining us. He is very focused – everyone who works for

him gets responses and there is no more running around.

We have aging infrastructure that we are maintaining and preserving for future generations. A finance committee has been created to look at ways to increase revenues. One thing we are doing (people might not like it) is implementing pay for parking in our parks and recreation areas. West Vancouver residents will be able to buy a pass for \$20 per year to park. We have noticed that Ambleside beach and park are always very busy and most of the visitors are non-WV residents.

The water treatment plant remains a big project to be resolved. A Spanish company was hired to do the plant design and build. They built it for Spain – not for our environment – and the company walked off the job. A solution is needed.

Water will be an issue this year. We currently have only 28% of our historical snowpack and this may lead to rationing.

Transportation continues to be an issue. We own the service, but it is part of TransLink. We currently have a \$600 million deficit with TransLink. The Federal Government must come to the table with funding to improve this.

The wealth tax is implemented this year. It is not school tax. Homes over \$3 Million will pay extra tax. People complain that the assessments aren't accurate and are often inflated. Some properties have enormous unfair taxes. An example is a property on Bellevue which has a tax bill of \$100,000 per year. The homeowner is hoping to leave the property to family. The taxes can be deferred which may add up a huge debt over time.

The Strategic Plan was circulated to members at the meeting. It is also online. Council's objectives for the coming year include Cypress Village. British Pacific Properties own all of the land above the highway. Deer Ridge Development was awarded to the municipality and the park and pop-up restaurant were developed. All the land above BPP land is to be designated as parkland in perpetuity and there will be no development. A density transfer will be done creating the largest park ever.


