He has worked in the survey engineering department at the University of New Brunswick, worked for McElhanney Ltd. in Vancouver and the United Nations development program, Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, and Triathlon/ MacDonald Dettwiler Associates in Vancouver.

His interests include genealogy, travel, the 51st highland division, WWII, and POW experiences for the past 12 years. Stuart has been the treasurer of the Eagle Nest Strata Corporation.

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### Tour of TRIUMF

A total of 27 members participated in this exciting tour on March 6. The guides for the tour Sakshi Kakkar and Michel Gennari were frontline researchers who took us on a journey to the subatomic world. We were shown the cyclotron producing intense proton beams, pet scanner used in medical facility and models of small cyclotrons that are portable and are in place at UBC hospital and VGH so that radioactive drugs with short half life do not require transportation. Their research on Anti matter, new radiopharmaceuticals which are chelated on an organic molecule and thus can arrive and released at the target cancer cell causing very little collateral damage on good cells.

The lunch at Browns Craft House at UBC was very good. We all returned to West Vancouver Senior Centre at 2:00 pm digesting the mind blowing information on Particle physics.

"TRIUMF is one of three subatomic research facilities in the world that specialize in producing extremely intense beams of particles. The heart of the facility is the world's biggest cyclotron, which is used to accelerate 1000 trillion particles each second.

TRIUMF is also a centre for the practical application of this basic research: It is the only centre in Canada using proton therapy to treat eye-cancers, and in the past was one of two centres in the world where pion beams were used on an experimental basis to destroy brain cancers in human patients.

TRIUMF researchers have built a Positron Emission Tomograph ("PET Scanner"), one of only three operating in Canada, used at the UBC hospital for specialized brain scans.

Scientists at TRIUMF are participating in developing new radiopharmaceuticals, microchips, computer software, original new designs for small cyclotrons, remotecontrolled equipment, analysis of mineral samples, and many other high-tech innovations.``

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## Last Month Speaker - Jeanette Ageson, Publisher, Tyee News

The Tyee organization was described as a 20 year experiment in independent online journalism. To start the presentation, She explained the old business model for newspapers and magazines, where funding/revenues for them was provided mainly through advertising, subscriptions, and newsstand sales. This model was extremely profitable. The days of classified ads were lucrative, being the main way to look for jobs, items, services etc. Subscription revenue paid for the cost of printing and delivery to households and newsstands. From the mid-20th Century to the mid 1990's the news barons of the past were created.

Eventually, the internet came along and shut this down, as technology provided a whole new way to present news and information that did not depend on advertisers, classified ads and subscriptions. The internet lowered the cost of entry to create specialty sites fort niche publications ... including the Tyee. The first major blow to the news industry revenues was the introduction of Craigslist. The second major blow was Google and Facebook targeted ads, and the third blow came when news was blocked by Facebook. Google and Facebook created a better mousetrap. In 2003, they offered open source software that dramatically reduced the cost of entry (no printing required). Since 2008 there has been a lot of turmoil in the industry including consolidations, mergers, and businesses closing. A lot of new outlets started up during this time but not all survived past the 2nd or 3rd year of operation.

It is not all bad news. Digital publications lend themselves to different models:

- 1. Clickbait big audience and cheap to produce articles
- 2. Information that gives you the edge which is like a closed Linked-In group
- Community of Values provides open access to readers and offers original content. This is the Tyee model. Does not offer "breaking news" but goes deeper on stories of interest thereby offering more quality to readers.

The Tyee News is a non-profit organization and depends upon voluntary donations from "Tyee Builders" as well as other supporters highlighted below, to cover their editorial costs. The "Tyee Builders" are readers who contribute a bit of money at a level and frequency of their choice. They rely on 6,500 subscribers that pay monthly as well as thousands of others who prefer to make an annual donation. A grant provided the opportunity to build the volunteer group. This support enables the Tyee to focus attention on publishing impactful journalism in the public interest and publish it for all to read. Their core of supporters make up about 1-2 percent of their daily readership, and enables them to pay their writers, keep articles free and open to all, and not bombard readers with advertising while they read. Other supporters include Core Steward Support (a major donor); Government support; Grants and Contracts; and Advertising.

Tyee News has a staff of 22 at the present time employed as journalists, editors, operations, and fundraisers. They produce 4-6 stories a day on week days in areas of City/Civic issues; Health care; Culture; BC Legislature; Northern BC; and Labour. All revenues/funds are reinvested back into journalism to keep growing the organization. They practice "Solutions-focused journalism" which means they do not stop asking about what went wrong yesterday and they push to investigate "what might go wrong tomorrow."

Three articles in Tyee News were referenced to demonstrate how they operate:

- Go to a different state or country where a solution to our problem shows promise. Their article is titled: "Oil Wealth" Should Norway be the Canadian Way?
- Find a small experiment in your midst producing tangible good. Can it be scaled? Their article is titled: "Inspiring Shipping Container Housing Set to Multiply".
- 3. Alive the possible solution, report back. Their article is titled: "Can the 100-Mile Diet Reach a Million TV Viewers?"

What is next for the Tyee?

- Achieving Registered Journalism Organization status
- Widening their scope Eastward, and North-South
- Figuring how to reach new people without social media
- As possible, starting up new reporting beats, putting more resources into investigations
- Expanding into new formats (video and audio)
- Convene community in real life
- Finally, some notes on how to be an engaged reader:
- Vote prioritizing which stories reporters should tack-le
- Share personal experiences telling what you know about your life experience
- Share specialized expertise contributing data or unique knowledge
- Participate Provide good-faith comments on stories to add to the conversation
- Read and share sent articles to friends you think would appreciate them
- Support If you read a source regularly, and they have a payment option, consider contributing money
