

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, followed by guest speaker Dr. Hélène Bertrand,

"Back Pain and Other Body Areas"



Hélène Bertrand received her MD from McGill University in 1965, at age 22. She has always been passionate about solving her patients' complex problems, doing research to check how well the solutions she found worked, and teaching. In the last 12 of her 55-year medical practice she concentrated on treating painful conditions. She developed a mannitol containing cream able to calm the nerves that send pain and itch messages to the brain, QR cream. She found new solutions to many painful conditions including one of the most difficult ones to diagnose and treat—low back pain.

Her newest book addresses that pain with a simple 2-minute exercise anyone can do to solve their low back pain without surgery or medication. This is what she will be talking about on September 8.

90% of all low back pain is called "nonspecific" (cause unknown). That is because the sacroiliac joints (between the pelvic bones and the sacrum) are so irregular, they cannot be assessed with x-rays, CT scans, MRIs or ultrasounds.

The examination Dr. Bertrand developed showed in what direction the pelvic bones were displaced. This determined the corrective exercise which immediately relieved 80% of all those with low back pain. By the end of the talk most people with low back pain will know how to find relief.

This past Probus year whizzed past with unbelievable speed. When I looked at my reminder calendar, I had to take a couple of minutes to realize this is my last President's column for Shorelines. It has been quite the year. I noted in previous messages that our club began to gradually transition back from Covid

restrictions. Past Presidents' Ron Wood, Darryl Stodalka, Gord Cook and Terry McLeod kept the club momentum moving forward when Covid shut down in-person meetings and then gradually permitted gatherings with certain limitations. My predecessors carefully managed our return to pre-Covid activity, and this year it felt like the old times were back.

Geological Tour Review

On August 20th a group of 14 Probus members went on a geological adventure led by fellow Probus member Lindsay Bottomer. We left the SAC by bus at 9:30 and headed out to Pilot House Point in the Caulfeild area of West Vancouver. Here we saw one of the most spectacular geological outcrops in the Lower Mainland. There were some dark green / black layered metamorphic rocks with an estimated age of 130 to 135 million years. Beside these dark rocks were some cream / grey intrusive granite rocks which form much of the North Shore Mountains. These lighter coloured rocks were formed deep in the earth's crust a mere 100 to 110 million years ago. Who knew our rocks could be so interesting.

The next area we went to was close to the Cleveland Dam and the Capilano River. Here there were more granite type rocks formed about 110 million years ago. The new feature was sedimentary rocks - sandstone and shale - on top of the eroded granite. These rocks were about 80 million years old. The final event we explored is the glacial advance and retreat over the last 1 to 2 million years ago. This glacier action formed the fiords of Howe Sound and Indian Arm.

Lindsay was very articulate and knowledgeable about this tour and we all were in awe of what we saw. Following our climb up 200 steps back to the parking lot, we all went to the Taphouse in Park Royal and had a delicious lunch. We all loved the outing and hope to have Lindsay lead another geological tour to the Whistler area next year. View photos on next page ...

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August Speaker Geoff Croll Review



West Vancouver Development History

Geoff Croll, President, British Pacific Properties, provided a comprehensive history of the development of West Vancouver, focusing on the acquisition of land by Pacific Properties in 1931. He detailed how the Guinness family, led by brothers Rupert, Arthur, and Walter, invested in the project, which involved building a bridge at First Narrows and developing the land for residential and recreational purposes. He highlighted the significant contributions of Alfred JT Taylor and the role of landscape architecture firm Olmsted Brothers in designing the area. He also discussed the financial challenges faced during the Great Depression and the subsequent sale of the bridge to the provincial government in 1955.

British Properties: A Development Journey

British Properties evolved from a land developer to a housing constructor and back to a land developer. Key projects, include the Park Royal Shopping Center, the Rogers Creek neighborhood, and various housing developments. Geoff emphasized the company's commitment to environmental sustainability, mentioning initiatives like the creation of wetlands, fish ladders, and extensive trail systems. He also discussed British Properties' history of innovation, including early adoption of energy-efficient building practices and a pre-Uber ride-sharing service.

Cypress Village Development Overview and Progress Update

Geoff presented an overview of the Cypress Village development project, highlighting its location, history, and key features. He explained that the village will be a mixed-use community with a focus on sustainability and walkability, featuring a mix of housing types, commercial spaces, and amenities. He emphasized the project's long planning history and its commitment to protecting environmentally sensitive areas while creating a compact, urban community. He also discussed the development's density compared to other areas and its gradual growth timeline, as well as the various amenities and public benefits included in the project.

The Cypress Village has had success as a popup site, with the branding strategy inspired by local rock formations. Infrastructure plans include a new site office, culvert construction and transportation improvements, while emphasizing the commitment to building over the next five years despite market challenges. Geoff addressed concerns about traffic, housing diversity, and healthcare facilities, noting that the community's needs have evolved towards more mixed use developments rather than single-family homes. He also touched on wildfire management strategies and the importance of creating a livable mountain village rather than a resort.

Geoff distributed some gifts including a book on West Vancouver's history and Cypress Village logo backpacks and expressed gratitude for the access provided by British Properties, which he has appreciated during his frequent hikes in the area.
