






Terry Hodgins has resided in West Vancouver since 1988. He has a Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering and a CPA – CA.

October Speaker Review



Our speaker today is Emily McCollum, and she is here to tell us about partnering with a service dog. She lives on Bowen Island, and she has a small computer outsourced company called Digitally Hip, which was established in 1998.

Emily has a Service Dog named Shay that is 6 1/2 years old, and she has had him for 6 years. Shay is a hearing dog. There are many types of support dogs available to people today, the most well known one being guide dogs that assist the blind and vision impaired. Other types include disability related dogs such as one that can detect the onset of certain medical events and provide advance warning to their owner, and emotional support and therapy dogs which are widely used to provide calming and increase confidence in handling stressful situations.

Emily discussed the use of a Bluetooth device to assist with hearing aids and shared a video of Bowen Island. She explained that her hearing dog, Shay, is owned by Dog Guides Canada and will be retired when she decides or when her abilities decline. When that happens, she will have to choose between keeping Shay or getting a new service dog, as she cannot have two dogs.

The presentation ended with a demonstration by Emily, who successfully called out commands for Shay to respond to (which Shay did so successfully), illustrating how much confidence this gives Emily to live life. She then gave an example of when she was in her car and backing up when Shay got her attention and wouldn't stop until she stopped and realized there was a commercial van behind her that she was about to back into.

Emily spoke to the financial challenges faced by Dog Guides Canada, highlighting a \$20 million shortfall due to a major donor's withdrawal and rising construction costs. She emphasized the organization's unique training programs for service dogs and encouraged attendees to consider donations. Emily also shared insights on lip-reading and hearing aids, recommending a course at Vancouver Community College for those interested in learning more about living with hearing loss.
